BRIEF DESCRIPTION

Tall bushy small-leaved shrub with wide-angled drooping branch tips and many small red fruit. Twigs fuzzy grey becoming orange towards base. Leaves 3-8mm long, base of leaf rounded, sometimes with very small tuft of hairs at tip. Leaves in clusters of pairs, those at tip of twigs usually much smaller.
